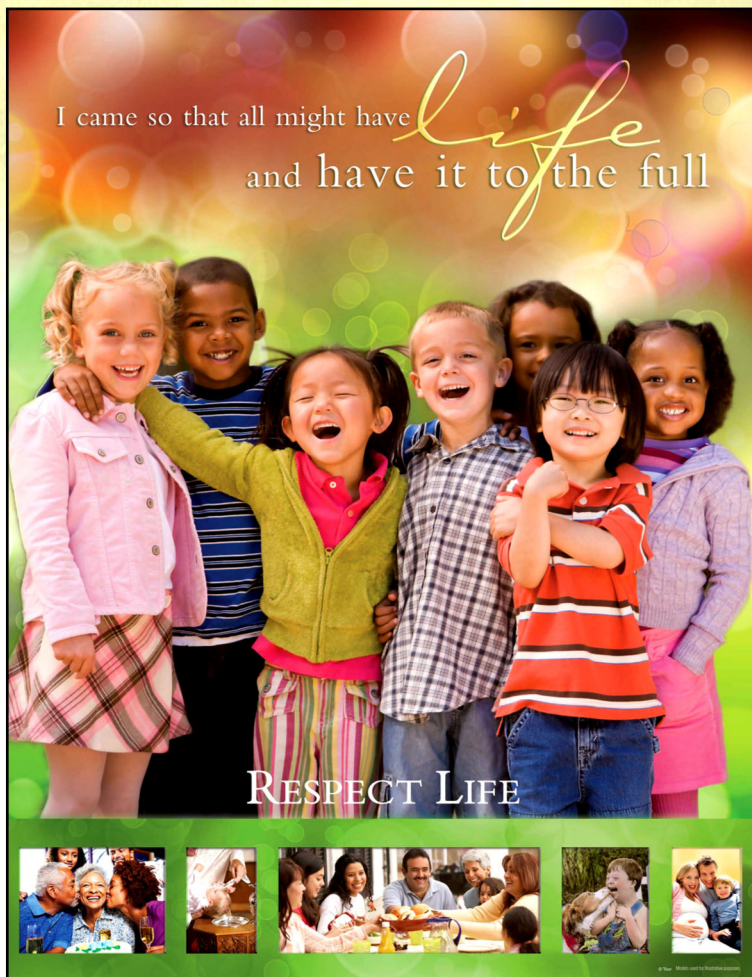

This last week began on Monday, January 18, with the holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. On Friday, January 22, we remember the heart-breaking Supreme Court decision Roe vs. Wade that removed most restriction on abortion in the United States. By the time you read this we will have new administration in our national government.

Today and in the days to come, we pray for our elected leaders and our whole nation that we may work cooperatively for racial justice, the protection and care for human life from its beginning in the womb until natural death, and economic opportunity for all.

On January 22, 1973, the Supreme Court, in the Roe vs. Wade decision, made its worst mistake in history. By declaring that children in the womb are not “persons,” it opened the door to tens of millions of abortions. Since then over 62 million children have been killed in the womb just in America. In fact each year, over 10,000 of these children (over 480,000 the last 48 years) killed by abortion were 21 weeks of development or beyond. Babies at this stage can feel pain and are only a few weeks from being able to survive outside of the womb. The Tragic Legacy of Roe v Wade

Since the Supreme Court decisions on January 22, 1973 that legalized abortion through all nine months of pregnancy, there have been few legal restrictions on this brutal ending of life. Contrary to the proponents who worked hard to make it legal, abortion has not solved the problems of poverty, family breakdown, child abuse, or domestic violence. Instead these problems have grown worse and our country is even more divided. Now many people have come to view abortion as a legal right rather than the ending of a human life. Since abortion is seen as a right, another national debate has gained momentum about the right to end our lives as our choice and to make that choice for someone who we deem has a poor quality of life, but is unable to decide for themselves (euthanasia). We as a nation have moved down a path toward treating human beings as disposable objects without dignity and a divine soul.

As we are reminded daily during this pandemic, every human life is precious and has value. **We are made in the image of God.** Legal abortion has not solved the problem of poverty, family breakdown, or domestic violence and it has physically and emotionally injured multitudes of women. The reality is that many individuals are not in our communities who would have taken their place in our society with their own unique gifts.

Let us pray that those who have chosen to have an abortion or who have pushed someone else to do this may seek the mercy of God. We pray that all Christians may work to help women and nurture and protect children especially those who are developing in the womb. We pray that we as a nation may turn away from evil and down the path to cherish each human person at all stages of life from conception to natural death. And we pray that this extends to people of all races and all areas regardless of their economic situation.

The Penitential Rite

Standing together in the presence of the Lord, we acknowledge our weakness, our sins and faults and failings. But the penitential rite is really less about our sins than it is about God's mercy. It is not a time for individual confession, like a mini-sacrament of reconciliation. It is, rather, a preparatory rite, preparing us to praise the mercy of Christ as we acknowledge our own weakness. When Simon Peter witnesses the miraculous catch of fish—when he realizes who is in the boat with him—he falls at Jesus' feet with the words, "Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man" (Luke 5:8). We are like Peter. The more aware of the Lord's presence we become, the more awareness we also have of our sinfulness, our weakness.

The penitential rite of the Mass takes several forms, from the traditional *Confiteor* or "I confess" to a litany, spoken or sung by the deacon or cantor with responses by the entire assembly. The penitential rite always includes the words *Kyrie, eleison; Christe, eleison*—Lord, have mercy; Christ, have mercy. This ancient Greek prayer came to the Roman liturgy from the East, and still echoes in many of the litanies of the Eastern Rite Churches. These words turn our gaze from our own weakness to the gentleness, the kindness, the forgiving love of Christ. —Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Restoration/Accessibility Campaign

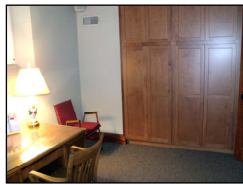

Saint Marianne Cope— January 23

Saint Marianne Cope, O.S.F. is also known as Saint Marianne of Moloka'i. She was born in Germany on January 23, 1838 was baptized Maria Anna Barbara Koob, which was later changed to Cope. A year after her birth, her family emigrated to the United States, settling in Utica, New York.

Cope attended a parish school until she reached the eighth grade. By that time, her father had become an invalid and she went to work in a factory to support the family. After her father died in 1862, she was able to leave the factory to pursue a religious life. She became a novitiate of the Sisters of the Third Order Regular of Saint Francis based in Syracuse, New York and she was a teacher and later a principal at a school for immigrant children. Cope also helped direct the opening of the first two Catholic hospitals in central New York.

By 1883, Cope had become the Superior General of her congregation. It was at this time she received a plea for help from leprosy sufferers in Hawaii. King Kalakaua himself sent the letter asking for aid in treating patients who were isolated on the island of Moloka'i. The King had already been declined by more than 50 other religious institutes. Mother Marianne, as she was then known, left Syracuse with six sisters to attend to the sick, and arrived on November 8, 1883. Once there, Mother Marianne managed a hospital on the island of O'ahu, where victims of leprosy were sent for triage. The most severe patients were sent to the island of Moloka'i.

The next year, Mother Marianne helped establish the Malulani hospital on the island of Maui. Soon, she was responsible for orphans of women who had contracted the disease as well as clergy who had contracted the disease while working with lepers. Many noticed that despite all her years of work she never contracted leprosy herself, which many regarded as a miracle.

Mother Marianne passed away on August 9, 1918 and was buried at Bishop Home. She was beatified in 2005 and declared a saint by Pope Benedict XVI in 2012.

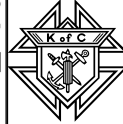

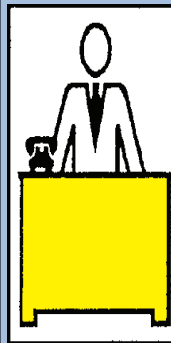
